Growing from Young to Old

The Changing Me

Children will recognise how their bodies have changed since they were babies and will explore where they are on the continuum from young to old. They will talk about the ways in which they have become more independent as they have grown.

Boys' and Girls' Bodies

During this session, children will develop an understanding of the differences between boys' bodies and girls' bodies along with discussing the correct name for specific parts of the body. Children will reflect on the other differences between boys and girls, discussing stereotypes that may exist. Children will explore the NSPCC PANTS rule and discuss that some parts of our bodies are private. Children will see age-appropriate outline drawings.

<u>Assertiveness</u>

During this session, children will learn about different types of touch. They will develop their understanding of their autonomy over their own body and their ability to talk about what they do and do not like- they will explore this through their sense of touch (things being smooth, rough, spiky etc.). They will develop confidence to say what they do and don't like and to ask for help when needed.
